## Paper 4 Writing 'Optionality' amendment



- Very popular 'Covid' amendment in Summer 2022.
- We submitted an amendment request to Ofqual to be able to keep the following features:
  - All question titles will now appear in English for both Foundation and Higher tier papers
  - An additional 5 minutes assessment time has been added to the Foundation tier papers
  - Increased optionality with the addition of Question 2(b) to the Foundation papers
- Applies to all 14 GCSE Modern Languages we offer
- All Specifications and Sample Assessment Materials have been updated to show the change.



## DfE/Ofqual Non-core vocabulary change





## DfE Vocabulary Amendment for Summer 2023



 Ofqual has removed the specific requirement for GCSE assessments to use vocabulary that is not on the vocabulary lists.

#### **NB**

- The 2016 GCSEs' vocabulary lists were not required to be comprehensive and presumed prior knowledge from KS3 study. This is very different to GCSE 2024!
- Our papers will only use words from the vocabulary list, plus words in the following categories: (see next slide)



### DfE Vocabulary Amendment for Summer 2023



- Derived forms from the grammar list, according to the tier, eg conjugations of verbs in all the required tenses, all the different articles.
- Cognates which are genuine cognates in the target language (eg impression, invasion, Energie) and not 'false friends' (eg monnaie, constipado, eventuell).
- Words which are assumed prior knowledge from KS3 eg colours, numbers and other commonly used items
- Common, easily recognisable place names and proper names (Paris, Madrid, Berlin)



### DfE Vocabulary Amendment for Summer 2023



- There may be a very small number of words not listed in the vocabulary lists and which are outside of the categories mentioned above, but whose inclusion is integral to the question.
- Any such words will be glossed and will not be targeted in the questions.

## Pearson Edexcel's accessibility amendments



- Pearson-specific and unrelated to Covid amendments.
- Summer 2022 was the first full series with these amendments.



- Designed to reduce cognitive load, level of demand and improve clarity.
- Full information, including a guide and video, is available on our website.
- Very positive feedback from teachers and students!



## Pearson Edexcel's accessibility amendments in brief



- Shorter extracts/texts in listening and reading.
- More accessible use of target language.
- Fewer and less demanding inference questions.
- Content more relatable and within the experience of GCSE students.
- Literary texts and authentic material (including cultural)
   more rigorously adapted to make them more accessible.
- Adapted design of listening papers to create additional pause time.
- Simplified bullets in writing paper and clearer rules for translation.
- Students now prompted to ask a question in speaking.



## Continuing our accessibility amendment success



We found that the students came out of the exams with more confidence than in previous years.

Students very happy.
Reported that the exam
was much more
accessible. Appreciated
slower speed of delivery
and more time to process
between questions.

Students at both foundation and higher tier were **much happier** with the exam this year. They definitely found that the removal of examples and shorter listening passages were a lot better.

Much more accessible to students. They like the multiple choice questions and find it better to have less inference questions.

There was a more realistic amount of cultural content than in previous years, and the level was more appropriate....

Students were delighted to receive a fair paper that wasn't trying to trick them...Students were able to show what they had learnt.



### Summer 2022 Grading



 Proportion of students achieving grades was to be at a midpoint between 2019 and 2021 grading.



Grade boundaries in 2022 may be lower or higher than when summer exams were last sat in 2019, as in any other year. However, the proportion of learners achieving each grade for qualifications will be more generous than 2019 but lower than 2021.

 For GCSE French and German there was also a +2% point adjustment for grades 7 and 9, and +1% point for grade 4 to bring in line with Spanish.



### Summer 2023 Grading



#### Ofqual statement, Dr Jo Saxton, September 2022:

- Students in the 2023 cohort have not experienced national school and college closures during their 2-year courses of study, but we know they have experienced some disruption.
- 2023 cohort will be protected in grading terms if their exam performance is a little lower than before the pandemic.
- We expect that overall results in 2023 will be much closer to pre-pandemic years than results since 2020. This decision means that results in 2023 will be lower than in 2022.

New GCSE (2024) development (French, German, Spanish)





### GCSE 2024: key features and changes

#### **BASICS:**

- Year 8 will be first cohort
- Tiering continues
- Speaking: 25% non-examined assessment

#### **NEW:**

- New focus on phonics via sound symbol correspondences (SSCs)
- Different approach in assessment objectives

#### **DIFFERENT:**

- Smaller vocabulary lists: 1200 FT, 1700 HT
- Less inference and only in reading
- Rubrics in English

Languages evolve as society changes – think of all the new words that have been created to enable us to talk about digital technology, for example.
